

I received several thank you cards recently from twins. I am grateful to have received them, because it was only possible because of the wonderful twins I work with. They make it a great niche organization.


For those twins unable to attend a conference, please try and make it to a regional meeting. Connecting with other twins is indescribable.

# DON'T QUIT

A famous composer-pianist was scheduled to perform at a great concert hall in America. It was an evening to remember black tuxedos and long evening dresses, a high-society extravaganza. Present in the audience that evening was a mother with her fidgety nine year old son. Weary of waiting, he squirmed constantly in his seat. His mother was in hopes that her son would be encouraged to practice the piano if he could just hear the immortal pianist at the keyboard. So - against his wishes - he had come. As she turned to talk with friends, her son could stay seated no longer. He slipped away from her side, strangely drawn to the ebony concert grand Steinway and its leather tufted stool on the huge stage flooded with blinding lights. Without much notice from the sophisticated audience, the boy sat down at the stool, staring wide-eyed at the black and white keys. He placed his small, trembling fingers in the right location and began to play "chopsticks." The roar of the crowd was hushed as hundreds of frowning faces pointed in his direction. Irritated and embarrassed, they began to shout:

"Get that boy away from there!"

"Who'd bring a kid that young in here?"

"Where's his mother?"

"Somebody stop him!"

Backstage, the master overheard the sounds out front and quickly put together

in his mind what was happening. Hurriedly, he grabbed his coat and rushed toward the stage. Without one word of announcement he stooped over behind the boy, reached around both sides, and began to improvise a countermelody to harmonize with and enhance "chopsticks." As the two of them played together, the master kept whispering in the boy's ear:

"Keep going. Don't quit. Keep on playing... don't stop... don't quit."

I found this story by Charles Swindoll in a book filled with a collection of stories on compassion and encouragement. It immediately made me think of our support group. In TTSGI, other twinless twins come along side of us to support and encourage us and accompany us on our journey through grief. When we think we can't make it they whisper "Keep going. Don't quit."

Sometimes we need someone to cheer us on so we can keep going. You can find these twinless twins at a regional meeting, our National Conferences and on Facebook. You can face the highest mountain and the climb won't be so high or cross the deepest valley and it won't seem so wide. Nothing is impossible when a twin friend is by your side.

## Once a Twin, Always a Twin: My meeting with Sarah, twin to Caz

Picture the scene. A summer afternoon in a very English tea shop. Betty's is famous, not just in Yorkshire, but globally. Afternoon tea comes on a three tiered cake stand. Sandwiches, scones and tiny exquisite cakes and of course tea in a silvered pot and with a tea strainer.



Today I'm meeting with two other twins. One is a twin who has contacted me for support because her twin is close to death. Her name is Sarah. Sarah still has her twin, but she knows she will lose Caz soon. She doesn't know how soon. Caz has terminal cancer and she lives on the other side of the world from Sarah in Tasmania. In reality, Sarah is already twinless. The other twin is Fran. She is one of my local group twins. She wants to support Sarah. This is our third meeting. The first was supposed to be with Sarah's twin, but that didn't happen. We always meet at nice places and we do afternoon tea. It is our hallmark. We can have fun. That is the strange thing about twin loss. It's not about being miserable. It's about being strong **together**.

Back to the teashop. It's August 1st and Yorkshire day. The gardens around the cafe are packed with kids welly wanging (Editor's note: this is a British term!) or just enjoying picnics in the idyllic surroundings. I get to the cafe first and ask for a window table. The staff clears one for me. I text the other two. Sarah arrives first. I feel excited. I always do when I meet another twin. It's a heady mix of relief, grief and adrenalin. Most of us are just existing until we meet up. We need our twin fix. It's the elixir of our survival.



Sarah looks exquisite as always. We all make an effort. We don't do drab. Fran is a few steps behind. She looks lovely in a cornflower blue dress. It matches her eyes. We hug and choose chairs, exclaim over the view of the gardens. The waitress waves a menu, but Sarah has other ideas. She waves her flower embossed iPhone. "I've got Caz on," she explains.

We accept it instantly. As twins do.

Caz is in Tasmania. It is 11.30am UK time and 8:30pm her time. We do FaceTime and Caz is with us. She is sitting in the empty chair at our window table. She looks pale. Brave. She is on chemo. I find it hard to fight down

the tears. But I must. I have to. I have to be strong for both of them. We let Caz know without words we will be there for twin Sarah.

We pass the phone around, laugh. Bandy words, show Caz the menu, show her the garden vista. Share. We watch the ping pong of her words with her twin then Sarah ends the call. Remember how it was with our twins? It was like that. But there is no resentment. We just feel glad for what she still has.

The waitress returns. We order full blown afternoon teas. Push the boat out. Tip the teapots. Pass my iPad around, look at pics, talk about the twinless conference in Detroit. How good it was. How the twinless twins embrace all twins whatever.

Time flies. We ask for the bill and walk outside into the sunshine. Together, we enjoy the incredible colours of the gardens and walk by the stream. As we walk, Sarah asks us if we ever sense our twins are with us. I tell her I do. Constantly. I didn't at first but I do now. It's that kind of thing which is so important for Sarah to know. We walk on and exclaim over the myriad beds of red and orange summer flowers. Sit on wooden benches when we are tired. See butterflies and a robin. Feel at peace. The kind of peace I only feel when I am with other twins. And I feel it with Sarah.



Too soon it is time to part. We hug, promise to meet again soon. It feels the same as it is with every other twin. We know we will miss each other as we separate, but that we are always there for each other. Sarah is a ground breaker. She felt instinctively she had to connect with us before she lost her own twin. It makes sense. If only that loss didn't have to happen.

At our recent National Conference in Detroit, I had the privilege of presenting the "Angel Award" to Joan Angelis, twin to Jean. I have known and worked with Joan for seven years. She is the Regional Coordinator for the North Central region and she has been the recording secretary for all our RC meetings and phone calls.

Joan is selfless, compassionate, kind and generous. When I came across this definition for an angel, I thought of Joan "a person who can brighten up the worst day only with a smile, a person who can make life bearable with the sound of their voice, a person who you have come to love." And we have come to love Joan!

In Joan's own words, "As the Regional Coordinator for the TTSGI North Central region for the last seven years, I have helped twins connect with each other within a seven-state area: lowa. Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wisconsin. Even though I lead a busy life, as the owner of a personal chef company, I have often said, "This (being Regional Coordinator) is the most important thing that I do with my life." My work with the Twinless Twins organization is my way of connecting and healing, and also of honoring Jean. When I help others, I help myself. More specifically, I feel that JEAN is helping others, through me. This is especially significant because of the fact that Jean took her own life. As horrendous as that was, I must recognize that some lives are better because of it. Her unspeakable act has also made the world a better place, through my work with TTSGI."

When Joan had the opportunity to spend the winter months in Seattle this year, she used her time organizing a Twinless Twins regional meeting which included twins from Western Canada, Washington and Oregon. Currently there is no Regional Coordinator for that region.

She saw a need in that area and filled it. Aided by the past Regional Coordinator, Pamela Fender, she assembled a list of potential attendees. This work for Twinless Twins filled her days, gave her a purpose and created a bigger twin "family" for her. It was truly a labor of love. On March 6, 2016, at noon, thirteen twins and two spouses met at the Best Western Plus Executive Inn, near the Space Needle. Half a dozen or so of them met the night before, in the hotel lounge. They laughed and cried, and shared stories with strangers who are now forever family.

In her "other" life, besides her work as a personal chef, she is a wife, mother and grandmother. One of my favorite things about Joan is that she makes me laugh! Laughter is one of the greatest gifts my twin gave to me. Thank you Joan for sharing this gift with all of us!



# MY DETROIT 2016 CONFERENCE EXPERIENCE

I first went to Detroit in 2010. That was my first Twinless Twins meeting and conference ever. I descended into the airport in a terrific storm and they lost my bag. This year I lost my bag and then there was a thunderstorm. I like to vary things! Thankfully my bag appeared at 4 AM the morning after I arrived for the 2016 conference. I spent the Wednesday recovering in the beautiful Marriott hotel at Ann Arbor, which has recently been refurbished.

Detroit 2016 began on Thursday, which is meetings day for the Board and regional coordinators. I had breakfast first, in the dining room. There was a wide selection of hot and cold foods and I had fruit, yoghurt, freshly cooked omelet and tea. The RC meeting went on until lunch time then we had a shared lunch with the board before a meeting with them. Afterwards, I joined up with my twin pal Jennifer and we had dinner with Sandy and Paul before we all registered for the conference. This year the conference shirts were turquoise and very smart. We went into the new twins meeting and introduced ourselves. Ray Boyle gave an address and welcomed everyone. We had desserts and drinks; then I went to bed early, hoping to sleep.

Friday was the first real day of the conference. I had an early breakfast with some of the twins before Inspirations at 8 AM. Afterwards we all went to opening of the conference in the big room. The keynote speech was given by Alicia Sims, daughter of Darcie Sims, the well know grief therapist who has spoken at conference on two occasions. The room was captivated by her positive approach to grief. Her message was that if we honour the life of our twins, we can look at anniversaries and significant dates more positively.

After Alicia's address, we had a break before the self-introduction time. Lunch was at 11:45 AM and this year it wasn't the usual boxed lunch with sandwiches and fruit, etc. We had an express buffet lunch in the hotel dining room for \$15. Break out options were available at 1:30 PM for those twins who preferred an alternative to the continued self-introduction sessions. I went to the writing class, but there was also a session for parents of Twinless twins. Dena Stitt facilitated our writing session, which was based on telling our twin stories. Dena shared with us a technique of writing where you look at a story from different character's points of view.



We left the sessions to change for the twin memorial walk. As we boarded the yellow school bus which took us to the start, I marveled at the progress the returning twins had made. I looked round at the new twins boarding the bus and saw how they had already made twin friends and how they were smiling more. The magic of the conference was working.

Those walking found the circular mile walk challenging, but we were proud to be carrying a banner signed by all the twins, in memory of our lost twins. There were water stops and energy bars stops, all provided by Michelle's lovely relatives.

After the walk, we gathered in the grassy area of the park for the balloon release. We wrote messages to our twins and after Sandra Brown read an address, we all released them to the soundtrack of Tell Your Heart to Beat again. As our balloons soared off into the blue Detroit sky, it was unbearably moving. Back on the bus, we travelled the short distance to the Marriott to shower and change, ready for a meal out or in. My twin pal Susan had arranged for a group of us to go to the highly recommended deli Zimmerman's, down in Detroit.

Saturday started early with breakfast and then Inspirations at 8 AM. Sandy's choice of music was moving, as she ended with Alan Pederson's track 'Thanks for the Little While.' The business meeting followed, when we heard the exciting news that the 2017 conference will be held in Arizona! After financial news, we moved on to the second keynote session with Alicia. It was very funny and clever, as she explored how our different personality types affect how we deal with our grief. Lunch followed, another Buffet with an Italian theme.

More breakout options were available after lunch. These included Suicide, Murder, Lingering Illness, Early Loss,

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Sudden/Accident under 18 and Sudden/Accident adult. Also a session for Family and Friends. I went to lingering loss. It was a large group so Venice divided us up into those beginning their loss, those just managing it and those who were coping and managing to honour their twins.

The closing ceremony was at 3:30 PM. Alicia ran this and it was immensely moving. We were all given a band and beads and we chose five for our twins to represent their qualities and attributes. We kept one bead back and put it into a large plastic jar which Alicia took round. As we put our beads in, we said our twin's name and also the quality of our twin represented by the bead. Alicia went round again and we all chose a bead from another twin, an unknown quality. We threaded these on our bangles.

As always, the conference finished with a magnificent banquet. This year we had a buffet meal with hot salmon and chicken. There were speeches and awards, with the coveted Angel Award going to Joan Angelis, who works tirelessly as a RC for Minnesota and who also started a new twinless group in Seattle. We lifted the roof with our



applause. The 50/50 raffle and auction followed, led by the incredible Dave Jones. All too soon the evening was over and Detroit 2016 drew to an end.

The next morning we all went our separate ways, echoing our thanks to Michelle and Ray. As I sadly checked out, all I could think of was three words. Roll on Tucson!



How it will get better. After Saturday's message we went around the room giving hugs. There is nothing like a big twin hug!!

Allie Franklin was a wonderful guest speaker. She talked about how after our loved one dies all we see is darkness. That all of these people in the room form a chandelier of light. I loved that analogy. She even had a magic wand with her and how she wanted it to work so bad. I remember that feeling. Friday afternoon we all changed into our shirts for the Memory walk and balloon release. We all stood on the hill and released our balloon to the song "let your heart beat again". A common theme that kept coming up for me was brokenness. A line in the song says "like a thousand pieces on the floor." How in our brokenness we can be made whole again. There is something very powerful about watching a hundred balloons float away with messages to our twin or loved one as there were many support people.

Here I am Janet's twin. As Michelle said: "the outside world doesn't see that."

Janet Baird came back to stay with me for a couple days. We both felt like we were coming full circle as we met for the first time in Detroit six years ago. Monday night we went out for dinner at the inn that I have raved about. Just





after the waitress had taken our order JB exclaims that she can see a butterfly on one of the flowers. I once saw two butterflies at Janet's grave. When we left I got pictures of her sitting on the bench. Just as we went outside the front door she spots a robin. We were sure that it was going to fly away but she took a picture and then I took one and it was sitting there as if to say I'm waiting for you. Robins mean HOME. The butterfly and the robin are signs.

## **FOREVER CHANGES**

Sunlight has a golden glow in October reflected from the red, yellow and orange leaves in their vanishing glory.

But the bright light and southern breeze felt like summer's encore when I drove my identical twin brother to the hospital 11 years ago as cancer had robbed him of his ability to care for himself.

Terry died 11 years ago in the Concord Hospice House finally free of the debilitating pain that gripped him like 110-volt electricity.

As the cancer claimed his bones, his pain intensified and morphine replaced the oxycodone. We knew what that meant. Our mother had died from cancer eight years earlier.

As the morphine began to work, Terry would be lucid one minute and dozing the next. After two days of morphine he was asleep most of the time.

His last night, I slept at the Hospice House. Terry did not ask me to, but I knew he wanted me there. After Terry began to sleep, I leaned down close to his face and said "Terry you can let go, Terry it's okay to die."

That was the hardest thing I have ever done and then I slid into the reclining chair where Terry liked to sit just days before and covered myself with a blanket.

I drank a couple of shots of Jack Daniels to help me sleep, but I couldn't. All I could hear was his raspy, labored breathing, the same sounds our mother made just before she died.

Early that morning, two nurses took Terry's vital signs, turned and told me if I needed to call friends and relatives I should do it now.

Soon our aunt and uncle and a close friend sat with the two of us as Tom Rush's The Circle Game played softly. Terry told me he wanted "Urge for Going" played at the gathering he reluctantly agreed to let me hold after he died. Terry already had the urge for going as his breathing became shallower and shallower and eventually stopped.

Walking out of the Hospice House, a biting mist and gray cold air had replaced last week's golden light and summer breeze. Leaves floated in the air one by one landing gently covering the green grass.

That was more than 11 years ago, but today I still remind myself to tell Terry about something I know he would enjoy.

The pain of his loss subsides, but the longing remains. This season's golden light still brings Terry back, but it is not the same as it was 11 years ago.

I miss you Terry and I love you.




