THE EMPTY CHAIR

"IF I COULD JUST SEE HOPE"

Like a firestorm blazing through a forest, the grief of losing a twin seems to leave nothing but ashes in its path. The hope and meaning in life appear to vanish. Yet even after a forest fire eventually there is new growth. You too can experience hope and the promise of new growth as illustrated in the story below.

When hurricane Andrew swept onto South Florida several years ago, it destroyed homes, wiped out neighborhoods, took some lives and some futures, wiped out businesses and left Dade County looking like a war zone. One of the things that hurt to look at was the trees. . . those that had not been uprooted, torn apart or blown away were completely defoliated. There were naked skeletons of trees upon our barren landscape. . . an area that is, despite its metropolitan design and large population, usually tropical green and lush with foliage now seemed to be nothing but broken concrete and shattered glass. Even the tree trunks wore that dead gray look that offered no color, nor comfort.

Even as the trees began to "come back" and we realized it would literally take years for the damaged areas to return to the lush green we had grown accustomed to, we knew it would never again be the same in Dade County. But as the sun broke through in places that had always been in shade before, something new took place. That winter, there was an abundance of wild flowers... beautiful bright flowers covered the ground in places that even grass would not grow before. Experts were amazed, as flowers that had not grown here for generations suddenly bloomed in abundance... and flowers that had always bloomed here suddenly were everywhere... everywhere! Apparently the stripped trees had allowed sunlight into places that it had not touched for so long... even touching on dormant seeds that had lain in the dirt for years. Salt water that had drenched the inland soil had damaged roots and leaves of existing plants, but fresh rains had rinsed it and left nutrients behind that the soil had been without. Nutrients these little flowers had needed to grow.

I was thinking about this, and remembering... and it struck me that grief is like that. As we look at the devastation left behind by our losses, we realize it will never be the same again. As we feel emptied out and stripped of the hopes and dreams we had held on to, we find ourselves laid bare to the elements... exposed in a way

we have not been before. But just like the aftermath of a hurricane, as we struggle to pick up the pieces and resume some sort of life ... a different life ... we find flowers flowers we may never have seen if the horrible storm had not entered lives. Flowers like friends who we may never otherwise have known, tenderness for suffering we may never have been sensitive to, appreciation for life, love and the blessings we used to take for granted.

There is nothing in this world that could make me want to experience another hurricane. There is nothing that will ever make it alright to me to have lost a twin... not once, not five times. But I do know that there are things I can be thankful for in the aftermath.


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POWER OF POSITIVITY - FOR BIPOLAR & ANYONE ELSE

---This is a sad story, but still one of redemption. I hope it will help others when dealing with their twin loss and with the depression or bipolar disorder, and to know that their life, too, can change for the better even after a sad event.


After 35 years have gone by, I still miss my identical twin brother, but his death was not in vain. For I have achieved over 29 years of "episode free emotional stability" with bipolar disorder. Perhaps a large number of people

want an identical twin in their life, maybe because it fills a need to be themselves "twice over". That is a positive need because it makes them feel that if one of them is at fault (for anything), the other will not be. It is not the lookalike (glasses, clothes, facial expressions, or hair line) that identifies identical twins. It is what lies inside of them: a double soul that contains a deep knowledge of who each one of them really is--in reality, their true identity.

I had that privilege for a short while (36 years), to live with my identical twin. But, 35 years ago a biochemical imbalance took him away from me. He took his own life in a deep depression resulting from his bipolar disorder. You cannot escape your own attitudes, for they will form the nature of what you see. And those attitudes may always control a negative image of your past, if you permit it.

I chose to look to the future and have my identical twin lead me to my own bipolar stability, fighting the same biochemical imbalance that we both shared. He and I are still the same, but also very different. Because I am alive, he is not. However, some of him is ... still with me.

There was a choice I had to make, to climb out of that dark side of my life and to overcome a very personal loss and make it into a positive. My twin's death provided redemption, pushing me toward building my positive attitude, so he did not die in vain. I am reminded of some simple decisions and choices I needed to learn while trying to replace the grieving of my brother's death.





THE IMPORTANCE OF TTSGI IN DEALING WITH TWIN LOSS

Twins have a special bond that other people don't understand. I was fortunate to find Twinless Twins Support Group, International soon after my identical twin Sherry's brutal murder on August 5th 1994. After 19 years, her case remains unsolved. Sherry was a Real Estate Agent who was killed in a home, which she had an appointment to show.

TTSGI has helped me understand the deep grieving, that I, as a twin suffer. I recently returned from the Twinless Twins Support Group's Annual Conference, held in Los Angeles this year, and met many new Twins who have recently suffered the loss of their twin.

I have now been to 12 annual conferences and several regional meetings in the Chicago area, with my first in 1995. Today, many twins are able to find TTSGI on-line, but in 1994 you had to find Dr. Raymond Brandt, the founder, on national TV and radio programs. I can't imagine how I would have made it this long without my precious twin if I hadn't found the support of Dr. Brandt and TTSGI.

The Decatur Police Department and the Macon County Sheriff's Office are seeking your assistance regarding two (2) unsolved murder investigations. With the anniversary dates of both murders soon upon us, our Agencies are jointly announcing a sizeable monetary reward being offered through the Decatur Area Crime Stoppers program for information regarding these investigations.

Through an anonymous donor, a **reward of \$10,000** each has been offered for Crime Stopper information leading to the arrest and formal court charging in the Sherry Lewis and Caleb Witty Murder Investigation. These generous rewards are being offered for information provided to Crime Stoppers **by August 31, 2013**, leading to an arrest and formal court charging. Both the Macon County Sheriff's Office and the Decatur Police Department are encouraging anyone with information on either of these two cases to take advantage of this narrow window of opportunity to receive \$10,000 for their information.

Information regarding these murders can be provided to Crime Stoppers by calling 423-TIPS (8477).

Sherry Lewis, a 30 year old Macon County area real estate agent, was found murdered on 08/05/94, at a residence for sale on Finch Drive, West of Greenswitch Road. This murder occurred in Macon County's jurisdiction and is still being investigated by the Macon County Sheriff's Office today. It remains unsolved. The Macon County Sheriff's Office Detective Division can be contacted by calling 424-1337.

Caleb Witty, 17 years of age, was walking with his sister on 08/04/11, in the area of 2200 Block East Johns Avenue, Decatur, IL when he was murdered during an armed robbery. While the investigation has remained open and active, Decatur Police Detectives are seeking additional information. The investigation remains unsolved. There were two persons involved in the Robbery/Murder of Caleb Witty. Decatur Police Detectives can be reached at 424-2734.

Then we went outside to the sunshine and pooled our picnic on the table and sat around on wooden benches to enjoy lunch. It was like eating lunch on the top of the world.

After lunch and group photos we went back inside to the parlour and resumed our meeting. After all the Lone twin introductions, I read a poem about the Stanbrook holding cross and we also discussed the Lone twin bench dedication on June 15th. There was a lot of interest in this and everyone loved the giveaway memorial card I showed them, with the picture of the bench. We decided we would visit the bench in the near future if we could arrange transport.

Then I told everyone about future meetings: London on October 12th and Harrogate on November 2nd. We ended our visit with Sister Julian showing us a beautiful blank book — which she is keeping as a Lone Twin Book at Stanbrook for all visiting Lone twins to sign and write in. Sister Julian has inscribed the most beautiful inscription on the first page in the shape of a rose, representing the unbroken link, with words by Robert Herrick.

"Love is a circle that doth restless move In the same sweet eternity of love."

The meeting ended at 3.30 pm and then we went to the shop to buy hand painted cards by Sister Julian and a selection of beautiful photos of the Abbey. Sister Julian also gave us a calendar each, with views and pictures of the Abbey. We drove off, leaving Sister Julian waving at us ... feeling sad to leave but also radiant after a very special Lone twin meeting. \blacksquare



Lea also serves on the Management Committee of the Urban Land Institute, Cincinnati and serves as its Women's Leadership Initiative Chair. She is also currently on the Board for the Center for Chemical Addictions Treatment in Cincinnati."



Matthew Robert Vierling, twin to Mark Lester Vierling, was born on July 7, 1986 in Denver, Colorado. After four years in the Mile High city, the family relocated to Los Angeles, California. In the summer of 1995, shortly after arriving in Aspen, CO for a family vacation, Mark collapsed and was immediately rushed to the local emergency room where doctors discovered the presence of a malignant brain tumor. After a grueling nine month battle, Mark passed away on May 1, 1996 at the tender age of nine. TODAY IS JULY 3, 2013

Today is July 3, 2013. Today I will be making sausage. This is something my twin brother, Paul, and I used to love to do together. We grew up inseparable for most of our lives. We were each other's best friends, worse enemies, and closest confidants. The two of us may have put on an act of dislike and disappointment for each other on more than one occasion, but it was simply an act. We loved each other like twins should love each other. We fought like twins fight, and we lived like twins should live...close, caring, and complete.

Twenty-seven days from today, I will be remembering and reliving the worst day of my life. While spending a Saturday afternoon on our boat, The Twin Links, and toward the end of the day, Paul jumped in the water to

swim after an inner tube that somehow became detached from the boat and started to float away. I tied the inner tube to the boat. But Paul jumped in after it. His cry for help was the very last thing I would ever hear from him. I immediately dived in the water after him, and swam as if a shark was chasing me. But I was too late. Despite efforts to resuscitate Paul on a small raft, then a Wayne County Sherriff patrol boat, then the ambulance on the way

to Seaway Hospital, we were too late. And Paul was gone.

The attending physician told us it was a massive heart attack. Later reports claimed he died from drowning, as some water was in his lungs. Following the autopsy, it was discovered that Paul's heart was one and a half times larger than it should have been. None of this really matters. Paul knew how to swim, but knew he wasn't in the best of shape either. But none of this matters now. I lost Paul. His wife, Megan, lost Paul, and his large group of friends and family lost one of the most interesting and important people in their lives.

Following his death I was faced with inner demons that would scare Stephen King. As a twin, I was faced with losing half of my soul, and certainly the closest person to me in the world. I see it now that things could have gone one of two ways - either dwell on my loss and turn to destroying myself in pity the way some people do after a

catastrophic event such as this. Or, I could dwell on my loss, and use the anger, pain, and grief to do something more.

Paul was a teacher at Lincoln Park High School for 11 years. I never knew how much of an impact he had on students until a week after his death that a candlelight vigil was organized for him by a number of his students. I never knew how much of a positive effect he had on kids who may have been confused with their future, or were looking for some guidance for post high school life. I never knew how someone like Paul could be humble enough to never speak of his influence until I heard kind words, and written notes, and offers of condolence from his present and past students. Paul was a teacher, but he was, more so, a great man.

Paul and I began a small sausage "company" together in the fall of 2005. It started simply with the two of us making batches of 40 or 50 pounds of various flavors of fresh sausage in his kitchen in Wyandotte, MI, on a Saturday afternoon, drinking beer and watching football. Paul learned the trade of sausage making while working at a small market for a few summers during high school and

college. Together, we spent countless Friday nights and Saturday afternoons making sausage, enjoying company, but oddly enough not talking much. As a twin, sometimes words aren't necessary to communicate at all. Making sausage became our means of spending the perfect "Peter and Paul" time together. Outside interference was rare, and sometimes unwelcome. This was our time

On July 30, 2011, Paul dived

in the water to swim after a raft that I had tied to the boat. He didn't make the swim back. I am left with the guilt, the grief, and the thought that perhaps it should have been me making that swim out, and perhaps this was supposed to be my time. Paul stepped in, and now is gone.

Since Paul's death, I have decided that dedicating more of my time to doing good things is my purpose. We have established a scholarship fund in his memory, volunteer at the Wyandotte Adoption Center, and continue to find ways to keep Paul's spirit alive in us every day. I will pursue our mutual goal to see our sausage company grow, to give back where I can, and try like anything to keep as positive as possible in what has turned into a very difficult two years. Half of me died that day, and I will never be the same. But I will try, I will remember, and today, I will make sausage.






"BEGINNING WITH THE END"
