We recently completed another annual conference. This year, about one third of twins attending were first timers, including one from Australia. Tucson was toasty, but not as oppressively hot as I had anticipated. I hope most who attended, found it to be a healing and social experience to be around other twins for several days. There really is no other event on such a scale as this, that provides that opportunity.

Over the years, newly bereaved twins arrive at Twinless Twins Support Group, International, with such a gaping wound, and they wonder how will they ever move forward? At the conference business meeting this year, I discussed the subject of creating a new twinless twin book. The concept would be, within structure, to explain anecdotally, how a twin travelled the twinless path, toward healing. This would include the struggles, setbacks, support, and successes encountered on the journey.

I discussed that the organization was in a reasonable financial position to pursue this project. I hope within the next newsletter, to be able to share a framework, in which twins wishing to participate, could share their healing experiences. I believe this is an aspect of hope that could be available to our wounded twins.

At the past conference, we honoured Sandra Brown with our biennial Dr. Raymond Brandt Memorial Award. She is the 14th recipient of this award, which is presented to those whose contribution and dedication to helping twinless twins parallels that of the late Dr. Raymond W. Brandt. Thank you to Sandra for your invaluable years of service on the conference committee and the Board of Directors!

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THE EMPTY CHAIR

THE WHALE

Several years ago, I read the following true story in "Grief Digest", a magazine which offers hope, information and support to those who have lost a loved one. The article called "The Whale" appeared in Andrea Gambill's column. The article is about a female humpback whale that became entangled in a spider web of crab traps and lines. She was weighed down by hundreds of pounds of traps that caused her to struggle to stay afloat. She also had hundreds of yards of line rope wrapped around her body, her tail, her torso, a line tugging in her mouth.

"A fisherman spotted and radioed an environmental group for help. Within a few hours, the rescue team arrived and determined that she was so bad off, the only way to save her was to dive in and untangle her... a very dangerous proposition. One slap of the tail could kill a rescuer.

They worked for hours with curved knives and eventually freed her. When she was free, the divers say she swam in what seemed like joyous circles. She then came back to each and every diver, one at a time, and nudged them. Pushing them gently around, she thanked them. Some said it was the most incredibly beautiful experience of their lives. The guy who cut the rope out of her mouth said her eye was following him the whole time, and he will never be the same."

When we are bereaved, Andrea says, "We are tangled in webs and restraints, similar to the whale's that threaten our very existence. Every part of us is immobilized in pain, and we are held captive, incapable of freeing ourselves. When we are lucky, along comes someone-like

the fisherman in the story-who cares about us and views us with compassion."

There are lots of "heroes" in our lives like those who saved the whale which may include counselors, funeral directors, friends, family members, co-workers, doctors, and ministers. Our heroes also include all the twins in the Twinless Twin organization who have reached out to us and given us support, encouragement and hope for 30 years! Our twinship experience is recognized, valued and honored by TTSGI.

I received the following email from Alia, twin to Rebecca several years ago in response to this column. Her reply will touch your heart. She is an example of how we can develop lifelong friendships through sharing ourselves and our stories with each other, continuing to help each other on our healing journey. Alia is now the Regional Coordinator for the Mid-Atlantic Region.

"When I read Sandy's "The Whale" column I was brought to tears. You see my twin sister was a marine biologist and had spent more than five years living on the ocean studying whales. At one point in her travel she had come across a sperm whale that was caught in some fishing gear. She and her crew mates decided to cut her free. The whale was in shallow water, but did not thrash with the approach of the crew. She looked at them as if knowing they were there to rescue her if she allowed it. These stories remind me of her love, the depth of my pain at losing her and of the fact there are those willing to help you if you open your heart and allow them to."

With time, patience and the help of others, eventually we can swim free in the ocean of life and even give back some of the love and effort that helped us when we needed it.

- 4. Journey to Healing


The Fall Edition will focus on the first one:

ONCE A TWIN, ALWAYS A TWIN

Because I lost Daryl at the age of 10 months, my parents never talked about her throughout my childhood, and there were never pictures of us with my other two siblings, I never considered myself a twin. That is until I met Dr. Brandt on the telephone after he was on a TV talk show called the Sally Jesse Raphael Show in 1994.

From there on my life changed, as he told me "once a twin, always a twin" and convinced me of that. It took me over three years, but he did. I went to my first TTSGI conference in 1997 in Chicago at the

McDonald College and then I realized, that I not only "was" a twin, I "am" a twin. That "once a twin, always a twin" phrase coined by Dr. Brandt was so true. I realized that although I wasn't raised like a twin, I am a twin and no one could take that away from me.

My parents were so grief-stricken from the death of my twin because we were both stricken suddenly with pneumonia and had been in the hospital for three weeks, but she died from what the doctors only determined was a "bad heart". No one really knew the cause of her death and they kept me in the hospital for a month afterwards. Now we know it was an arrhythmia termed "Long QT Syndrome," and I have it, too. I have a pacemaker implanted from a heart attack I had in 2005 caused by this same arrhythmia.


My grandmother, from the time I was about 3 or 4, told me about Daryl and throughout my lifetime told me stories about our short life together. Otherwise, I probably wouldn't have known about us since my parents never would talk about us. My mother gave me an album of us when I was in my 50s that I didn't even know existed.

I will always be grateful to Dr. Brandt for being patient with me those three years when he would call and write to me although I would tell him I really didn't remember my twin, so I didn't think I was a twin. And he would tell me so many times, "Yes, Dawn, you ARE a twin. Remember "once a twin, always a twin". Now, so many years later I've been a volunteer for the organization and I'm telling twins the same thing. I am so blessed to have had my grandmother and Dr. Brandt in my life to help keep my Daryl in my heart.

MY FIRST TTSGI CONFERENCE EXPERIENCE

The first time I ever thought to explore being a twin was when I saw Dr. Brandt on TV in the '90s. I contacted Twinless Twins and received information about being a Twinless Twin. Let me tell you more to understand my twinship journey.

We were born July 5, 1960. Our parents named us Kathleen Ann and Mary Kathleen; today I call us Katy n Kay. Between us, we weighed less than 6 pounds and were each 12 inches long - we were due in mid-September. MaryKay lived for 9:45 hours; she was given to medical research then cremated, but I don't know if she was buried or where. I remained in the hospital and I was not held by our parents until the day before I went home.

I grew up knowing I was a twin, I learned being a twin was shameful and a family secret. Mom only spoke of MaryKay in passing, blaming me for things that went wrong with our birth and her life. I grew up with guilt and self-esteem issues that still affect me today. My brother who is five years younger, didn't know about MaryKay until he was 12 years old.

Flash forward to 2017: In therapy for other issues, I felt I had deeper issues that impacted how I acted and reacted to life. This was proven when I spoke about my twin loss. My therapist told me I could grieve MaryKay - he gave me permission to grieve our twinship. I was struck with disbelief, this wasn't possible, for me to embrace my twinship. I was filled with immense fear as it would mean looking at core beliefs I had held all my life. Yes, I needed permission!

This has been and still is an intensive and soul-searching journey from "me" to "we". Discovering the deep ache and sense of loss in my life, which could not be filled with any other type of addictions I tried - to no avail, until rediscovering Twinless Twins. I looked on the website and discovered that the National Conference was in Tucson, I lived two hours away! What a sign, I registered immediately and fear and anxiety set in. How could this help me when everything else hadn't?

As I drove to Tucson, my anxiety and fear was immense. I had never met a Twinless Twin before. Would they accept me? I tried not to have expectations as I had been let down so many times before. How could this be any different? Oh, the fears and questions I had. I texted several Twinless Twins some of my fears, including Joyce, my twin roomie! They reassured me that this could be life changing. Oh, how little did I know how true this was going to be!

From the time that I met my first ever Twinless Twin, Beverly, to the last conversation with Katie about Hummingbirds. Aloha Michael Ohana means family! Never have I felt so accepted and loved in my life! It was like having an instant family reunion. One I never had, yet I knew none of them a few days before. How could this be? I haven't stopped to question this; I have filled the missing void with my Twinless Twins. No longer am I ashamed to be a twin and the ache has lessened. I'm still on a journey, one made easier by all of my new Twinless Twins! I am so glad to have taken a risk and to be vulnerable in my Twinless Twin Journey with you all. I'll close with an email I sent to my new Twinless Twin.

Margaret,

Thank you for welcoming me to a fantastic group of people. It was such a blessing to meet everyone in Tucson. This conference exceeded my expectations, I came with many questions and anxiety - I left with a peace unlike anything else in my life. I was not expecting the love and acceptance I found. This has changed my life in so many ways. I am able to enjoy my twinship for the first time. Huge progress for me, I will find a way to Ohio next year. Having a twin family is amazing.

Thank you again for taking the time to welcome me with open arms.

"Terry Lewis-Foor: Non-profit a legacy for murdered twin"

On Aug. 5, 1994, at age 30, Sherry Lewis, a Decatur real estate agent, was found murdered in a Macon County residence listed for sale. A name was written in her appointment book for a 1 p.m. appointment. None of Sherry's family members recognized the name in her appointment book. Twenty-three years later, the case remains unsolved. We were all devastated by Sherry's murder and continue to be

as it remains unsolved and we continue to seek justice for Sherry.

I never stop thinking about Sherry. She is in my DNA! I never thought my identical twin Sherry would be gone so young. Since Sherry's been gone, crying moments can happen anytime, anywhere, and reminders are all around. I know I will never be the same again. I cherish the memories we had of being twins 30 years together. The moment I found out, I knew I would never stop grieving for my twin.

That day changed everything for me. My whole life was shattered instantly as two men, a Sheriff's Deputy and a coroner, approached me outside my mother's home in Maroa. They were asking for my help to find house number 226.

I started trembling as I pointed to my mom's house. The coroner said, "We need to go in and talk." I knew, and could feel, Sherry was dead. I hadn't been able to find her all day and that evening. We had planned to go to the Decatur Celebration.

I remember Kurt, my fiancé and now husband, weeping as he headed inside to wake my mother. I continued asking questions while trembling on the inside. I was in shock! The coroner repeated that we needed to go inside and talk.

Out there on the sidewalk, I asked him if Sherry was dead. He said yes, indicating Sherry had been stabbed to death. We found out later that Sherry was not stabbed and instead had been beaten and strangled. At that moment, my body and mind felt like never before, a part of me was gone forever.

I tried to remain calm. I just had to know more! I said, "Where did this happen?" He said in a house for sale and I asked if the house was vacant and he replied yes. I continued asking questions, once inside, and I just couldn't believe I would never be with Sherry again. I felt so bad and really didn't know how I was going to move forward.

My whole life revolved around Sherry. A part of me died with Sherry that day and it wasn't like when other family members had died. This feeling would be a lifetime of missing my utero-bonded twin. I have years of anger knowing that someone has gotten away with murder.

Three months after losing Sherry, I was fortunate to find a support group called Twinless Twins Support Group International. Dr. Raymond Brandt founded TTSGI in 1987. There had been no place for twins struggling with the loss of their twin for support.

Dr. Brandt had been a guest on numerous national and international TV and radio programs. He founded the support group years after his identical twin Robert's accidental death at age 20.

In 1995, I attended my first Twinless Twins Annual Conference, where I met Dr. Raymond Brandt. Connecting with other twins through TTSGI gave me a better understanding of the misery I was suffering. After meeting him, I knew I wanted to help with his mission of keeping this support group around for current and future twinless. Dr. Brandt was dying of cancer and didn't tell many people. He finished his book, "Twin Loss," even through the sickness of his cancer.

In 2001 Dr. Brandt succumbed to his cancer. Many members have kept his mission of "Healing by Helping" alive. TTSGI provides a safe and compassionate community within which twinless twins can experience healing and understanding.

I am truly honored to currently serve on the Board of Directors and annual conference planning committee of this 501(c)(3) non-profit support group. 
THANK YOU TO RENEE MANGER, TWIN TO STEPHEN






We had a great summer tea party at Hettie's in Skipton on July 1st. Seven twins from the North of England



By Betty Jean Case


